- A safer environment for residents and visitors by increasing the number of conservation officers.

Investing in Michigan's natural resources

Starting March 1, 2014, Michigan's hunting, fishing and ORV license prices and structure will change. The new structure will make buying a license simpler and provide vital funding to improve outdoor recreation opportunities for hunters, anglers and ORV riders. Michigan's license prices will remain competitive with other Midwest states.

What's new?

• Anglers will no longer need to choose between restricted and all-species fishing licenses. All fishing licenses will be good for all species.

• An ORV trail permit will be required, in addition to the ORV license, for riding on state-designated trails.

• A base license will be required for all hunters (a base license is not required to purchase a fishing license). The base license:

- Provides critical funding for habitat and conservation work on both public and private land.
- Supports the work of conservation officers and field staff to ensure safe, legal hunting practices are followed.
- Includes a small game license. Whether you hunt small game or not, your base license dollars will enhance and expand hunting opportunities, which benefits hunters of all species.



What you need if you want to...



Base license – required for everyone who hunts in Michigan, allows hunters to hunt for small game and purchase additional licenses

• Combination Hunt and Fish license - includes an annual all-species fishing license, a base hunting license and two deer licenses
