Did you know that Kevin & Keith Lalone started the paddle boat race in the 80's with a buoy far from shore in front of the Willow Beach Resort and Kerry Moore reinvented the event in its current form up and down the channel? Education and information have always been a high priority for the GLA. We currently boast one of the best lake association newsletters and websites in the state! (Yeah, I'm biased...but I've only seen a few that even compare...). We now have a highly active GLA Facebook group (1000+ members strong) for community information and posts, a GLA Facebook page that is dedicated to lake stewardship topics, and we're resurrecting email blasts as yet another form of communication. Our newsletter has been going since the 70s and has had high quality content driven by the extensive efforts of editor and board member Jeannette Garrison. We can thank Jamie Paramski, Jim McGreal, and the newsletter team for pushing it to a new level in the last decade or so. The Gravel Laker is distributed to ALL GL residents and strives to educate as well as entertain. Additionally, the GLA provides a free *Michigan Riparian* subscription to all dues paying members (upon request). This publication is a leader in all lake stewardship related topics.

The Gravel Lake Association is connected. While Gravel Lake is first in our minds, we still look outward for information, counsel, and support. The GLA is an active member of the Michigan Lake Stewardship Association, the Michigan Waterfront Alliance (a lobbying group that represents riparians or waterfront homeowners), and maintains a regular, open dialogue with the Michigan DNR, Porter Township board, and the Van Buren County Sheriff Marine Patrol. The GLA president (myself) and secretary regularly attend MLSA meetings where we share and receive information about the challenges and successes of other lake associations such as water quality, aquatic invasive species control, fundraising, natural shorelines, boater safety, etc.

Lake stewardship is the core of the Gravel Lake Association's mandate. As homeowners around a lake, we assume (or sometimes shirk) the duty of protecting our natural resource. Though it is easy to view Gravel Lake as purely a recreational area, much of its allure comes from its clean water, great fishery, and associated wildlife and plant life. The GLA regularly stocks fish to improve the sport on our lake, but also does its due diligence on the appropriate amount, timing, species, and impact to the lake. (Continued on Page 3)

Additionally, we have pursued additional water quality testing via Professional Lake Management and through participation in the Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program (CLMP...thanks Greg Garrett!). We now have a secretary and president that have become Shoreline Ambassadors who can teach others the basics of restoring some or part of shorelines to nature in an effort to further improve water quality for fish and other aquatic animals. Through a rather large investment of over \$10,000, we were able to conduct a whole-lake survey to more rigorously determine the current state on fishery health, water quality, aquatic plant community, and watershed impacts. (This survey validated many of our efforts and suggested the need to revert our highlydeveloped shorelines back to nature). The GLA has also worked with Clean Boats, Clean Waters and the DNR to host a boat wash on GL as well as educate public access visitors on the need to clean their boats as a means to curb the spread of invasive species. Historically, the GLA pursued two major water quality projects: aquatic invasive plant species control to rid the lake of Eurasian Watermilfoil (EWM) and the creation of a special assessment district (SAD) to pay for the construction of the Lakes Area Sewer Authority. In the year 2000, a small group (with Art Earl, Craig DeSimone, Shelly Carpenter, and Lynn Flavin as president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer) sought to restart a virtually defunct GLA with the goal of addressing a growing EWM infestation and a virtually non-existent checkbook balance. Through lots of research, door to door conversations, and an extensive petition drive, this new group was able to establish a SAD for aquatic invasive species control. Several years later, this growing group was able to do the same for the abandoned sewer effort of the 1980s.

Overall, the GLA is an organization that serves a variety of interests from social and community, to environmental. As a GLA member, you're supporting all of these various efforts including the important projects of the past as well planning and preparing for the challenges and opportunities that lie ahead. We thank you for your support and hope you'll convince others to do the same!

- 2. Drain all water holding compartments (including live wells, bait wells, and bilge areas).
- 3. Dry boats and trailers before entering another body of water.

Michigan House Bill 4362 - Boating Hours

On March 13, 2019, Michigan House Bill 4362 was introduced by representatives Sheppard and LeGrand. Many of you read about this on Facebook. My intention is to provide as many facts as are currently available. The bill is to amend 1994 PA 451, entitled "Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act," (MCL 324.101 to 324.90106) by adding part 306. The exact language follows:

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- PART 306 INLAND LAKE REGULATION SEC. 30601. AS USED IN THIS PART:
- (A) "PUBLIC BOATING ACCESS SITE" MEANS THAT TERM AS DEFINED IN SECTION 78101.
- (B) "PUBLIC INLAND LAKE" MEANS THAT TERM AS DEFINED IN SECTION 30901.
- (C) "VESSEL" MEANS THAT TERM AS DEFINED IN SECTION 80104.

SEC. 30602. SUBJECT TO SECTION 30603, THE DEPARTMENT SHALL DETERMINE THE HOURS OF OPERATION OF ALL PUBLIC BOATING ACCESS SITE OR AROUND PUBLIC INLAND LAKES. THE DEPARTMENT SHALL POST A NOTICE AT THE ENTRANCE OF EACH PUBLIC BOATING ACCESS SITE THAT STATES THE REGULAR HOURS OF OPERATION OF THAT PUBLIC BOATING ACCESS SITE. THE NOTICE SHALL BE POSTED IN A VISIBLE LOCATION, AND THE LETTERING OF THE NOTICE SHALL BE OF A SUFFICIENT TYPE SIZE TO BE EASILY READ BY VISITORS.

SEC. 30603. OPERATION OF A VESSEL ON A PUBLIC INLAND LAKE IS LIMITED TO BETWEEN THE HOURS OF 8 A.M. AND SUNSET, UNLESS FURTHER LIMITED BY SPECIAL RULES PROMULGATED BY LOCAL ORDINANCE RECOMMENDED BY THE DEPARTMENT UNDER SECTION 80110.

This particular language has sparked quite a bit of feedback from riparians and boaters throughout the state. As a result, the authors of this bill are re-writing it. Fox 17 News (West Michigan) reported that representative Sheppard intended to expand the timeframe that boats could be on inland lakes. They state that "Sheppard said he came up with the bill because he's seen lakes that have public boat access, but limit sporting activities to a certain timeframe." "Sheppard says part of the issue was that it was interpreted to apply to all the lakes in Michigan." He did not intend it as a restriction on all lakes (i.e. lakes without restrictions). Sheppard's team is working on alternative language.

The Gravel Lake Association Board of Trustees has reviewed this topic and is awaiting the new language before potentially writing our Michigan House & Senate representatives (Beth Griffin and Aric Nesbitt, respectively). If the new language is still objectionable, both the Gravel Lake Association AND homeowners around Gravel Lake should be prepared to write, call, or email these representatives.

Spring has sprung in the Intercoastal Waterway! The Michelis welcome two female Indian Runner ducklings to their family. Their names are Sandy and Willow, named after the Gravel Lake beaches the Micheli family has resided over the years. Serafina and Josephine (the human daughters) call them "Princess Lily" and "Quack Quack."

Indian Runners (*Anas platyrhynchos domesticus*) are known for their upright carriage that resembles a penguin. Instead of waddling like most ducks, runner ducks "run" or quick step. They have long slender necks and their eye placement is high on their heads. Female ducks tend to be more vocal, but aren't as aggressive as drakes. They lay 300-350 greenish blue eggs per year and are excellent foragers. This species has wings but cannot fly. When fully grown, they will be white and fawn in color like Mango. They will be free to roam during the day but will be locked up in their coop at night to protect them from predators.

Meanwhile, across the channel at the Witteveens, CJ, Mark, Ava and Jake have adopted two ducks of their own! Macaroon is a French Rouen and Quackers is a Peking. Female French Rouen ducks are brown, whereas the males are gray and brown with a green head. Peking ducks are white in color and known for their calm demeanor. The Witteveens joined us as Gravel Laker status in Fall 2018. Say hello to them when you are cruising through the channel this summer!

Meet a Gravel Lake Family: The Lone Willow on Willow Beach



Every now and again, the sadness hits me. Sometimes it's in my gut, sometimes it's in my throat, but mostly it's in my heart. About five years ago my family lost Heinz and Hertha Gutmann. They were our parents, grandparents, and great grandparents. They passed away peacefully within six months of each other. I like to think they're on a boat ride at the great Gravel Lake in the sky, Heinz with his gin and tonic and Hertha feeding the neighborhood stray cats. I'm sure several of you reading this article can share an anecdote, a memory, or how they touched your lives in some small way. I like to look at the little things around me that remind me

of them; my china cabinet that once sat in their living room, my grandmother's handmade quilt she made me, my grandpa's German soccer scarf, my son's middle name (which I am sure he will one day have to explain to friends and teachers—sorry Jack Heinz!), but my favorite thing to see that brings them back to me is the lone willow tree on Willow Beach.

To explain how that tree got there, I will have to take you back a few years. After immigrating from Germany to Canada, then from Canada to the U.S. in 1959, Heinz and Hertha settled in LaPorte, Indiana. During the summer they would travel to Traverse City, rent a cabin, and enjoy the outdoors with their daughters, May and Patsy. The long journey to Traverse City would soon seem too far, as they discovered they would be welcoming a third child in 1966, my Aunt Barbra. That year they were also planning a trip back to Germany, but because Hertha was pregnant, they decided to cancel the trip. With the money they had saved they decided it might be time to purchase their own cottage. They saw an ad in the South Bend Tribune and began their search.

The first home they saw was on Cedar Lake. Oh how our family's decades-long love affair with this lake would have changed if they settled there, but it was on too big of a hill. They fell in love with their place on Gravel Lake because it reminded them of the little cabins they would rent in Traverse City. Shortly after taking up their summer residency at the lake they decided the heat was a little unbearable so they wanted to plant a tree. Their home in LaPorte had a large willow tree growing in the corner of their yard. They cut a branch off that tree and planted into the ground by the beach of their new lake house and before they knew it, it implanted and began to grow into the large tree we see today.

They added on a few rooms, changed the color a few times, built their big beautiful deck, and hoisted their American flag accompanied by their German flag just underneath. I know my grandpa took great pride in his second home; it was part of his American dream. As an immigrant, he moved his family and children, country to country, home to home, to seek out a better life, and to ensure his children didn't see the war-torn life he and my grandmother grew up in. A parent's love can truly be measured in the lengths they will go to set up a better life for their children. The journey didn't come without its fair share of challenges; a new language, a new community, and feeling like they didn't belong. My mother recalls that their first lake neighbors had three sons who would spend their days outside playing horseshoes, enjoying a drink or two, and would affectionately call my grandpa "Heiney". He wore that nickname like a badge of honor, his "American" nickname. He fit in. They found "their place".

Gravel Lake became a place where they no longer felt like outsiders. The years would bring them many lifelong friends and neighbors they could share a meal or a drink with. If you were lucky enough to enjoy an afternoon on their deck, you probably got one of the best tasting gin and tonics from Heinz, or coffee and cake from Hertha. If you were sitting by the water, you felt the cool shade of their giant willow tree. They would eventually welcome six grandchildren to share the lake with. I was lucky enough to spend most of my childhood summers with them, and with my parents at their place they purchased over 30 years ago not too far down the beach. I truly had a unique opportunity to be with them, on this lake, and I could not be more thankful.

The sadness still hits me, although the sting is not as strong. I still catch myself off guard when I see something I want to call them

about, when I see my grandpa's goofy little grin on my son's face, or when a stray cat lets me pet her. I am comforted by my memories of them I get to keep, the legacy they left, and all the things I get to enjoy that were made possible only because of them. The willow tree that sits in front of their cottage, now owned by my Aunt Barbra and her husband Steve, to me is a symbol of their journey to seek a better life for their family. It is something we have been able to enjoy since we lost them, and something we hope to enjoy for years to come.

The Red Fox



Cunning and cute as can be, Red Foxes have been frequenting the Gravel Lake area for the past few years. I have been lucky enough to have had some up-close and personal observations of an adorable fox family this winter and spring. If you take a walk through "the woods" on Huff's Landing, keep your eyes peeled for these furry friends. The Red Fox is very adaptable to its environment but they prefer wooded areas with easy access to resources, like water! This makes Gravel Lake the perfect home (and I agree!).

These intelligent creatures can grow to be as large as 24 pounds, about the size of a small dog or a large cat. The fox's most distinguishing characteristic is its big bushy tail, which is used for warmth as well as balance.

Foxes find their mates in the winter and are believed to be mostly monogamous. With a short gestational period of about 2 months, the female fox, or vixen, will birth a littler of up to 12 kits! The kits will be brown or gray at birth

and about a month later they develop their signature red coat. The family will live in a den that is most often built by the vixen. Both mom and dad are hands-on in raising

their kits until the fall, when the little ones are old enough to be on their own. When a kit is finally able to hunt and survive independently, the diet of choice can be anything from fruits or berries to small mammals like mice, chipmunks, moles, or squirrels. They also love a plethora of invertebrates such as crayfish or caterpillars. The red fox has incredible hearing which allows it to hear its small prey from far distances or even burrowing underground.

It is important to be aware that this small and intelligent animal is NOT a danger to you or your family. If anything, they help keep small vermin at bay! Most often, the fox will retreat when he or she is approached. Like any wild animal, there is always the chance of a fox becoming rabid, so strange behavior may be a red flag to keep your distance. Please be respectful of the fox and keep your kiddos and pets away from their dens and their kits. Observing these cuties can be a real treat, but please do so with respect. Sharing our lake with a variety of wildlife is one of the things that makes it so special!
